8 Studio Essentials- Linda Aman-Aman Arts

I have a unique situation, I have two studios set up. One in our home in Star and one where we are in Idaho Falls. We have lived in various places in our lives and I've set up a lot of different studios. My first studio was in a closet that I had to push my clothes aside and work in a very tiny space. I could close the sliding closet doors and it was out of view and children's reach. Later it grew to a corner in our living room. As many of you know I am blessed with a large classroom and studio in our Star home that allows for a lot of big tables for work space. Our two-bedroom townhouse we live in Idaho Falls has the second small bedroom as an office/studio and guest bedroom (inflatable bed) when we have company. So, I must be creative with my space. I have discovered what is the most essential in a studio for my working style.

- 1. **Lighting-** natural light when possible. I use full spectrum light bulbs in the day and night, so I have a consistent light to create.
- 2. **Ventilation**-especially when working in oil or mixed media. Even as a watercolorist we still need fresh air to keep us healthy.
- 3. **Storage**-we never have enough storage. Stacked plastic totes under the table, plastic drawer units work well. Even one tall storage cabinet can yield a lot of space. I find great storage units at thrift stores and estate sales.
- 4. **Functional Zones** in a small area or large space having things in their place helps the process to stay on task to find materials. Put like items together for easy access, use large labels. I also had to buy an area rug to protect our carpet.
- 5. **Inspiration**-this might be folders of ideas, books, bulletin boards, computer files, keep new inspiration in your view. Display your paintings you love as a reminder you Can paint!
- 6. **Comfort-** make your studio yours, a studio that invites creativity, whatever space you have make it a place you want to create in, can't wait to go to. Organized or chaotic you know how you work best...make it personal.
- 7. Water-sink or water source. Water can even be 2 buckets one of fresh water and an empty, if a sink is not close. In my Idaho Falls studio, I have a bathroom sink I don't want to ruin, so I take out the stopper and I have a funnel I dump water down the sink hole (careful don't drop a brush in the hole!) then my sink is kept white. Problem solving is what we do. (I have also used this method for hotels sinks)
- 8. **You-** Your being there is how you create your masterpieces. Make studio hours on your calendar, You are the most essential studio piece. (also, wherever you create...call it your studio space)

This is criteria I consider when setting up a studio even if it is temporary or at a kitchen table. When I travel and teach, I keep these simple steps in mind in a new space. It helps me stay focused to teaching and creating. I am confident you can add to this list. I hear from artists all the time; my studio is a mess I can't paint in there. Maybe this article will help you get back in there messy or clean make the space a creative one, one of production.

In this new year...Design your studio as a place of inspiration that invites you to make the next masterpiece! I would love to hear from you.

RANDOM THOUGHTS

Thinking about this column I had several ideas but none seemed to stand large or alone. So here are some thoughts. Some may be autobiographical but are probably not wholly new territory if you have any artistic seasoning at all.

If your painting slowed down during the recent holiday season it might be helpful to try something different. Recently I suggested in this column that one way out of a slump is to do what you've done before. Here, to move beyond a slowdown, I suggest doing something different: a new technique maybe using different tools...or new subjects you've never tried before...working at a different speed, from quick to more deliberate or the other way around...using a new palette, new colors (I have six relatively new hues on my pallet that are keepers).


Maybe your painting is not up to the standard you had a while back. This has been a problem for me. Over the years I have destroyed a mountain of watercolor paper that was a mess...on both sides. I call it quality control and have done it several times recently. But don't put bad paintings out for the trash without tearing them up. Years ago we came home from errands to find the trash pickup guys with several of my discarded pieces lined up along the side of the truck having their own art show. That was probably 45 years ago. If they kept something I hope they still enjoy it in spite of its original inclusion in the trash.


What are the best ways to use photos in planning and doing a painting? First, I would say, don't let the photo be your only direction through the work. In my thirty years of teaching three different studio classes per week (I had a lot more energy then) I must have suggested a thousand times for members to put the photo down and work toward finishing without it.

So, if you're using photography as a starting point and an exact copy is not your thought, why not work out the composition with a sketch? If color notes will help, make them in the margin.

And finally, I have a huge collection of old time photos, most in black and white only, that I am willing to share with any of you. Lots of them have been used in my work over the years but anything you'd do with them would be yours and not mine. I'll email some to you. Let me know. Nearly all of them need compositional improvement.

Here are two. Try them if you like.





Spring workshop With Lauren Johnson March 22-23-2019

This two day workshop will help you understand and master the importance of the placement of the forms in your paintings whatever your subject matter. We will begin with a refresher on why the placement of the objects in your workspace contributes to the success of your finished painting and will do exercises to practice them in the most dynamic way. We will work through the planning process beginning with the selection of the size/shape of the paper/surface you choose to paint on, placement of your line drawing, planning value patterns and the the funnest part...applying the paint. Sounds complicated, but basically we will be helping to get your drawing in the right place before you start to paint.

After successful careers in the business community Lauren now devotes her passion to art. She has studied with several local artists in Albuquerque and a variety national instructors. She works in transparent watercolor and water based pastel on varied surfaces and paint a variety of subjects including landscape, still-life, abstract, southwest design, floral, animals and portraiture...all with an eye on the design patterns of shapes and values. She has shown and been a frequent award-winner in juried shows. She is a signature member of NMWS, TWS and a Distinguished Merit Member of IWS. She has taught classes and done workshops with emphasis on design and composition for over 20 years.

PROSPECTUS -2019 ANNUAL IWS JURIED MEMBERSHIP EXHIBITION ABOUT THE SHOW AND JUROR

The IWS statewide exhibition is juried by a nationally acclaimed artist, who also facilitates a workshop. This year's juror will be the highly acclaimed artist, Iain Stewart. You can learn more about him at: Iainstew.fineartstudioonline.com **ELIGIBILITY**

Must be an active member of Idaho Watercolor Society. Annual dues of \$40 (or \$45 if newsletters are mailed instead of emailed) must be paid **before** entering the show. To pay dues send a check payable to IWS to Membership Chair, Sue Antonich, 872 E Bergeson Street, Boise, ID 83706.

PAINTING SPECIFICATIONS AND STANDARDS

Entries must be original water based paintings on paper or paper-like support. Some collage or other media may be incorporated as long as water-media constitutes the majority of the work. All entries must have been painted within the last two years and must be entirely the work of the entrant, not copied from another artist or any published photo, and must not have been done under direct supervision of an instructor. Oils, water-based oils, or computer generated images will not be accepted. All work must be suitable for family viewing. If any painting is found to be in violation of this standard, if any of the stated specifications are not met, or if the work differs from the original digital representation, it will not be exhibited, and all awards will be forfeited. The exhibition committee and the juror will be responsible for enforcing all rules and regulations. Once accepted into the IWS juried show, the same image and composition, or substantially similar image, can not be entered again. When pricing paintings, keep in mind that for paintings sold, commission fees for various venues may be up to 50 percent. In addition, a 15% donation to IWS is suggested.

FRAMING SPECIFICATIONS

Mats must be white or off-white. A darker liner or fillet of up to ½ inch is acceptable. **Plexiglas or acrylic must be used rather than glass for framing,** and a **strong foam-core backing must be used**. Outside dimensions of frame may not exceed 40" on any side. There is no minimum size restriction. Simple, clean looking frames are encouraged. Paintings must be prepared for hanging with firmly attached, strong wire. No sawtooth, other hanging brackets, or frame clips will be allowed.

DIGITAL ENTRY SPECIFICATIONS MUST BE <u>EXACTLY</u> AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Dimensions</u>: 1200 pixels for the longest side of painting with no frames or borders
- <u>File format</u>: Use only .jpg
- <u>Resolution</u>: 300 dpi
- <u>Compression</u>: Size of the jpg file cannot be more than 1.5 MB
- <u>File name</u>: LastnameFirstname-ShortenedPaintingTitle.jpg (example: PicassoPablo-3Musicians.jpg). If you are having a professional scan your painting and submit for you, the title on the jpg image **must** matche the title on the entry form and is in the format listed above.
- **CD's are no longer accepted!** Please have a professional submit by email **OR** call Dennis Hayzlett, 208-514-3862, for help with PC entries; **OR** call Laurel Lake McGuire, 262-748-3307, for help with your MAC entries.
- If you are not sure your image file is per specificaions seek assistance BEFORE you send it in. Entires submitted incorrectly will be returned for correction only once.

ENTRY FEES

The fee for entering one painting in the show is \$30. While only one painting can be accepted in the show, you can increase your chance of acceptance by entering two paintings for a total fee of \$35.

SUBMISSIONS

Use regular mail to send your Entry Form and a check for entry fees payable to IWS to Lauren Johnson, 14600 W Daimler St., Boise, Idaho 83713. If you DO NOT have a personal email address send a self-addressed, stamped, #10 envelope to receive notification regarding your entries.

DELIVERY AND SHIPPING OF ACCEPTED PAINTINGS

Please note all dates listed under "IMPORTANT DATES." Detailed shipping instructions will be sent if you are accepted into the show. Shipping materials must meet all the requirements in the acceptance letter. A \$10 fine will be assessed for use styrofoam peanuts or shredded paper for packing. Artist will be responsible for cost of shipping to BSU and back to the artist. Detailed instructions will be given at a later time regarding pick up of paintings returning from Traveling Show.
